Instructions

- Please read the stories first
- Use a clean piece of A4 paper to match your drawing to one of the stories given
- Make your drawing or painting colourful (upright or sideways)
- Keep well inside the edges of the page
- Your drawing can be vertical or horizontal (upright or sideways)
- Label your drawing with the name of the story, well away from the edges of your drawing
- Write your name, age, and school on the page but well away from the edges of your drawing
- Get permission from an adult to have your name printed with the picture if we can use it

1 God Made a World
